




The Need for Statewide Solutions



This letter is submitted to you in support of ACWA's recommended Statewide Water Action Pian (SWAP). We provide this support for ACWA's plan and commend ACWA's executive director Tim Quinn for his facilitation in this process because it is a good start to identifying a wide-ranging list of critical issues that the Administration

extended droughts, and the concern for endangered species, habitat and sustainable forests to ensure reliable water supply and water quality, combined with limited new water supplies have put California's citizens, its economy and its environmental resources all on the brink of disaster. We need your strong leadership to develop a Statewide Water Action Plan that holistically addresses the tough choices for environmental regulation, new and expanded infrastructure from the crest of the Sierra Nevada Mountains, and changes in the operation of the state's water systems that will protect all Californians and successfully adapt to future conditions.

Additional upstream storage to supplement Delta flow is a solution and a means of providing improved Delta health, protection of valuable agricultural land, and the possibility of increased delivery south of the Delta, in addition to increased reliability. Our fear is that the difficulty and challenge of finding this statewide comprehensive solution will lead to half measures and redirected negative consequences, like moving shead with the tunnels without also resolving the tough in-Delta and upstream Delta headwater issues; the source of water for the Delta.

Actions to Improve Statewide Water Supply

- Expand storage
- Invest in WUE/ IRWMPs
- Facilitate water transfers
- Protect and improve water quality
- Pass a water bond





Actions to Protect Water Rights

- Respect area of origin commitments
- Operational assurances: We should <u>not</u> plan on reservoirs going to dead pool









Actions to Protect the Integrity of the System

- Complete a BDCP, consistent with these principles
- Invest in levee improvements / maintenance
- Prepare for emergencies to protect public safety
- Improve and expand groundwater management
